IV. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

- ❖ *The Foundation recognizes the capacities and potentials of students and their parents for active and meaningful involvement in their families, schools and communities.*

A. Livelihood Program

1. Sewing Livelihood Project in Baguio City

Sewing Livelihood Project was revived due to the current situation brought by the COVID-19 pandemic, wherein many people lost their jobs. This project aims to provide livelihood to the mothers in Baguio City. They make washable face masks using woven cloths, foot rugs, pot holders, bags and pouches.

Through this project, the mothers' beneficiaries were able to earn some amount of money as an alternative source of income to provide the needs of their families.

Livelihood Products:

- Hand woven Face Masks for kids and adults
- Thin foot rags
- Thick foot rags
- Twisted foot rags
- Pot holders
- Bags
- Coin purse

2. Sir Peter's Fund (Microcredit) in Batangas City

This is a microcredit initiative of Chance for Growth (CFG) for the mothers in Isla Verde to start their own business to somehow augment their daily living. This project helps the families to have alternative sources of income to provide their needs.

For this year, the staff in-charge conducted a follow-up to the recipients of the projects and at the same time updating them. Collection of fees was received from 3 beneficiaries. Most of the beneficiaries are in difficult situations to repay their loans because their income and the capital were used for their family consumption.

3. RATP-Microcredit Project in Pasay City

No activity was conducted due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

B. Medical & Dental Mission in partnership with Chance for Growth at Isla Verde, Batangas City

No activity was conducted due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Mass gathering was not also allowed in compliance to the safety protocols of the Philippine government. More so, doctors, nurses and other medical personnel are frontliners in combatting the pandemic.

C. Feeding Project in partnership with Chance for Growth at Isla Verde, Batangas City

Alouette Foundation in partnership with Chance for Growth and Käthe-Kollwitz School in Germany continued the Feeding Project in Isla Verde, Batangas City. Everyone was struggling because of the pandemic. There were a lot of restrictions implemented by the government. Yet it was not an excuse to combat malnutrition. This project specifically aimed to help lower the rates of children with malnutrition and give assistance to the undernourished children in Isla, Verde. Moreover, to educate the parents and guardians on how to feed their children right and to practice a healthy lifestyle too.

The Feeding Project for this year is way different from the previous years. Mass gathering is prohibited, there were no face-to-face classes, the school from where Feeding Project would be facilitated was closed and not accepting students as of now, unlike before that feeding was conducted in the school. That is why distribution of food packages to 50 beneficiaries was a good alternative. Food packages with vitamins and nutritious foods were handed to the beneficiaries every month, along with data gathering such as height and weight were collected through the assistance of the parents' beneficiaries.

Alouette Foundation of the Philippines, Inc. in partnership with Association Alouette France was able to conduct a timely and relevant activity through the support of its generous donors and sponsors, dedicated staff and Board of Trustees, and the cooperation of the beneficiaries. During the activity, the healthy protocols were also ensured such as the physical distancing and wearing of face masks and face shields. The beneficiaries were happy to receive the vitamins and grateful for the continuous support of all the donors and sponsors considering that we are all affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Those selfless efforts are one of those acts that makes the beneficiaries hopeful and positive despite the pandemic.

E. Alouette Urban Garden

Alouette Urban gardening was developed in line with the theme of the second quarter activity of the beneficiaries under sponsorship and educational assistance program which is home gardening. This project aims to provide fresh vegetables for the families where they can get it for free and for their pastime to become more productive especially during quarantine. This project also helps reduce the garbage because the Foundation recycled the used bottles and containers instead of buying new pots. The Alouette Urban Garden is located on the riverside in Rodriguez, Malibay, Pasay City under the care of one of the mothers. The plants are already growing and soon to produce harvest for the families.

F. Alouette Digital Hub

The Digital Hub is an initiative of Alouette Foundation in partnership with the Association Alouette France to help the students access education during this pandemic. The students were provided laptops with internet connection and printers. Despite this difficult time, the students were able to continue their studies and they have given hope to reach their dreams in life. Moreover, this project will also be for basic computer training and to start after the pandemic.
